

CLARITY IN THE VOTING BOOTH

Our choices in the upcoming November 2014 election reveal a clarity that is perhaps more striking than that seen by any previous generation.

The age of living a "comfortable Christian life" is over. We live in a culture that kills several preborn children every 60 seconds and works tirelessly, at every possible moment, to destroy the sanctity of marriage, pervert our children, and undermine the family.

So, what can we do? We know that Scripture tells us we war against "powers and principalities." We war against Satan and his evil spirits that have been unleashed on this age. Fear is an instrument of the devil that is used to intimidate and silence our beliefs. It is used to make people feel uncomfortable about standing up for the truth or risking being ridiculed for their beliefs. But we live in a time when being a Christian requires a sincere and courageous commitment to follow Christ and live our faith without fear. Therefore, we pray, we stand firm, and we know that if Christ is for us, who can be against us?

But there is more we can do; there is more we must do. We also live in a country whose freedoms and greatness were forged by men and women whose anthropology was belief in Jesus Christ, unwavering belief in the greatness and goodness of natural law, and the fundamental belief that serving God and living according to His truths brought God's blessings and peace to this great nation. They sacrificed their comfort, they sacrificed their freedoms, and they sacrificed many of their lives to allow us to enjoy the lives we have today.

We cannot afford to look back 5, 10, or 20 years from now and lament, "I wish I could have done more" to preserve our freedoms, and preserve the goodness and virtue of right thinking and moral beliefs. We have a responsibility that is bigger than ourselves; we have a moral obligation that is as serious today as at any point in human history.

We can have no fear and we must act. You have the power and moral responsibility to vote for men and women who first fear the Lord, and through their deep commitment and love of God, try to avoid offending Him.

When I'm asked if I'm a Democrat or a Republican, I respond as follows:

"Since 1973, the Democratic Party has facilitated the deaths of over 60,000,000 innocent preborn children through decriminalized surgical and medical abortion. They have embraced every form of killing: surgical abortion, chemical abortion, medical abortion, infanticide, and outright murder. They have embraced perversity and homosexuality as a God-given right, and have demonized timeless moral truth and those who stand for virtue. Their deception is relentless, and many of them shamelessly profess, in the same breath, that they are "Christians."

I have lamented the death of the Christian Democrat, for it seems that the terms "Christian" and "Democrat" are now antithetical. At the same time, many of us can think of Republicans who are no better than what I have just described.

However, I would also point out, by way of contrast, that there are many brave men and women who fearlessly stand for life; for marriage; and for the defense of the family, our religious liberty, and our other freedoms.

For this election, take on the responsibility to prepare yourself by reading and growing in your understanding of what is at stake. And then support and vote for men and women who authentically embrace life, embrace truth of marriage and the family, and who have not dedicated their lives to promoting murder, other forms of evil, and deception.

The hour is dark, but your light can make a difference.

As we pray the Rosary before our Masses in this month of October, we will pray In reparation for sins, for all those serving in our armed forces, for peace in the Middle East and For the Consecration of Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.
