



New Pro-Abortion Strategy - -

Encourage Women To Shout Happily About Their Abortions ???

This new strategy founded in desperation is mystifying to almost everyone on both sides of the abortion issue.

Abortion is a highly personal experience in which a woman, usually emotionally stressed by a pregnancy she fears, seeks out an abortionist and is willing to pay him or her to kill her unborn baby.

After the abortion most of the time she will not advertise the abortion and will not return to her job with boxes of donuts and cupcakes celebrating the event.

Since the pro-life movement has made abortion a public issue through marches, demonstrations, media ads, etc., the implication in most people's minds is that there is something very wrong with the act of abortion.

The early arguments embraced by the pro-abortion leadership started out by saying that abortion will prevent women's death or injury from "back alley abortion." In time the message morphed into "it's my body – it's my choice."

When that didn't swell the ranks of people publicly accepting abortion, they tried a softer message "we want abortion to be safe, legal and rare." That argument disappeared quickly when the number of abortions began to drop and so did the profits in the abortion centers.

Now they are spinning a new strategy. Let's tell women that their natural maternal feelings are only the result of guilt from religious teachings and that women should celebrate their abortion experience. Perhaps some may try to sell it as a right of passage from adolescence to adulthood.

The pro-abortion community may actually reap the opposite of what they seek. Women may revolt at being told they should be happy about their abortion.

Some experts think this last approach may totally backfire and that women have had enough of being told how they should feel and what they should say about their abortions.

Since *Roe v. Wade*, innumerable women have sought healing from their abortion experience by visiting crisis pregnancy councilors, clergy, doctors, family members, Project Rachel and friends. (*Choose Life, 2018, issue 3.*)

Dutch Doctor May Face Criminal Charges For Euthanizing Elderly Woman Against Her Wishes While Relatives Held Her Down

The case involved a woman in her seventies, who was placed in a care home after her dementia became so advanced that her husband could no longer cope with care at home. She was distressed and frightened, and after a few weeks, the doctor at the home determined that she was suffering unbearably. He concluded that she was not mentally competent, but that an earlier statement in her will that she wanted euthanasia "when I myself find it the right time"; justified killing her.

The story was greeted with horror around the world, as it emerged that the doctor drugged the victim's coffee, and had her family hold her down as she tried to fight off the lethal injection. Despite the woman not being mentally competent to consent to being killed. The initial review panel cleared the doctor of all charges. Now, the Dutch medical complaints board has formally reprimanded the unnamed doctor - the first case in which a practitioner has been formally censured since the Netherlands made it legal for doctors to kill patients at their request in 2002.

The board found that the doctor should have discussed the fact that a sedative was put in her coffee – which did not happen – and only carried out the euthanasia if she agreed. (Excerpts form LifeNews)
