SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Arrangements should be made with the Pastor at least six months in advance of the intended date of marriage. Preparation classes with the Pastor are required.

If you know of anyone who is seriously ill, hospitalized, shut-in, or about to undergo surgery, please contact the Pastor or the Parish office to let us know.

SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

Saturday 4:00 – 4:50 p.m. at St. Thomas Aquinas Church, and 30 minutes before all Masses and anytime upon request.

HOLY COMMUNION: We welcome to the Holy Mass all who share our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. While all are welcome here, we cannot extend to all an invitation to receive Holy Communion. This is not for lack of Christian hospitality. Rather, it is the recognition by the Catholic Church that real divisions of faith and practice do sadly exist among Christians. Practicing Catholics who go to Confession whenever needed are invited to receive Holy Communion. Non-Catholic Christians and those Catholics who should not receive Holy Communion (including those married outside the church and those in need of the sacrament of Penance) are asked to pray for a spiritual communion with the Lord Jesus and for the unity of His Church. Those who are not receiving Holy Communion but who would like to receive a blessing are invited to indicate this desire by crossing their arms across their chests as they approach the priest in the Communion procession.

Rest in Peace, Pope Benedict

Last Saturday, December 31, 2022 at 9:34am Vatican time, Pope Benedict XVI died. I have a special love for Pope Benedict because he was pope during a crucial period in my life. I was a sophomore in high school when he became Pope and by the time he retired I was finishing up my first year of seminary. During these years I began really practicing the Catholic Faith for myself (as opposed to being Catholic because it's what my parents made me do). It was during that time that I first considered being a priest and, later, took the concrete step of quitting my job and entering seminary.

Born as Joseph Ratzinger about 95 ½ years ago, he became a true intellectual giant. His complete works take up 16 volumes and he was an expert in the writings of Saint Augustine. After being ordained to the priesthood in 1951, he earned a doctoral degree and a license to teach theology. He was sought out by university students because of his talent for communicating the ideas of theology and the teaching of the Church. He went on to become a bishop and was made a Cardinal by Pope Saint Paul VI. Pope Saint John Paul II put him in charge of the Vatican's doctrinal office, the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. He spent over two decades in this role until the death of John Paul II after which he was elected Pope by the College of Cardinals in 2005.

After his election, Pope Benedict was portrayed as a hardline conservative and was called by some "God's Rottweiler" to disparage him. In reality, Pope Benedict was what he had always been: a classical liberal. The reality of how Pope Benedict conducted himself before and during his time as Pope could be characterized as nothing less than kind and gentle when dealing with people while remaining firmly uncompromising on the teachings of Christ and His Church. Pope Benedict frequently emphasized God's love for humanity and the fact that God wishes to be in a relationship with us. His first letter to the Church was titled *Deus Caritas Est* and was on the topic of Christian love. He had a rare talent for writing about profound truths using simple language.

But being smart or a good teacher or even a pope is not a sign of holiness; actually, they are hindrances to holiness. What is admirable about Pope Benedict was his humility. There are two examples which come to mind. First, after being elected Pope, he wrote a series of books that were published under the title Jesus of Nazareth. In the Forward to the first volume he wrote, "this book is in no way an exercise of the magisterium [i.e. the official teaching authority given to the Church by Christ], but is solely an expression of my personal search 'for the face of the Lord' (cf. Ps 27:8). Everyone is free, then, to contradict me." Pope Benedict was recognizing the truth that, while he happened to be the Pope when he wrote this book, he was not writing the book *as* Pope and therefore he was open to any criticism.

The second instance of humility is his "retiring." In his resignation, Pope Benedict said, "in order to steer the ship of Saint Peter and proclaim the Gospel, both strength of mind and body are necessary, strength which in the last few months has deteriorated in me to the extent that I have had to recognize my incapacity to adequately fulfill the ministry entrusted to me." Pope Benedict was in the habit of recognizing the truth and conforming his actions to it, even if that meant renouncing the most powerful office in the world when such action practically had no precedent.

I would like to finish here by canonizing Pope Benedict; but canonization is not my job. This was a man who, however admirable his virtue, had almost unimaginable responsibilities and thus has much to answer for to the Divine Judge Who cannot be deceived. So we should do as good Catholics do and pray for the repose of his soul.

I close with words from the Spiritual Testament written by Pope Benedict himself: "Jesus Christ is truly the Way, the Truth, and the Life - and the Church, in all her shortcomings, is truly His Body. Finally, I humbly ask: pray for me, so that the Lord may admit me to the eternal dwellings, despite all my sins and shortcomings. For all those entrusted to me, my heartfelt prayer goes out day after day."
