Arrangements should be made with the Pastor at least six months in advance of the intended date of marriage. Preparation classes with the Pastor are required.

HOLY COMMUNION: We welcome to the Holy Mass all who share our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. While all are welcome here, we cannot extend to all an invitation to receive Holy Communion. This is not for lack of Christian hospitality. Rather, it is the recognition by the Catholic Church that real divisions of faith and practice do sadly exist among Christians. Practicing Catholics who go to Confession whenever needed are invited to receive Holy Communion. Non-Catholic Christians and those Catholics who should not receive Holy Communion (including those married outside the church and those in need of the sacrament of Penance) are asked to pray for a spiritual communion with the Lord Jesus and for the unity of His Church. Those who are not receiving Holy Communion but who would like to receive a blessing are invited to indicate this desire by crossing their arms across their chests as they approach the priest in the Communion procession.

Visiting Priest and Confession

Next weekend I will not be here. Father Bill Kuchinsky will be covering the Masses here again. As usual, please make an extra effort to be kind to him. It is not always easy to find someone who is both able and willing to cover weekend Masses here. This makes my ability to have extended time away from the parish limited (and maybe it's also good for you to get a break from hearing me every week). So it's a bit of a help to me if you are kind and gracious to visiting priests.

This also presents a good opportunity for you to GO TO CONFESSION! I realize (and I'm sorry for this) that there was no visiting priest who came to Tucker County to hear confessions this Lent. This was my failure, no excuses. Although it is a few weeks late, you have this opportunity now. When I told Father Bill that I would exhort you to go to confession, he replied "I won't be able to voice print them! And, [I] am gentle as a lamb in the box!" I thought his comment about voice printing was pretty funny (which is why I repeated it here!). I can also confirm by my experience that he



is a good and gentle priest in the confessional as I myself have gone to confession to him. I am not telling you to do anything that I myself have not done.

There is an academic publication titled *Journal of Religion and Health* that published an article back in 1985 titled "The Value of Confession and Forgiveness According to [Carl] Jung". The abstract reads as follows:

This article represents a broad survey of the views of C. G. Jung regarding confession and forgiveness. Man, a naturally religious being, has a need to confess his wrong and to gain forgiveness of one sanctioned to absolve. The curative effect of confession has been known for centuries. Without confession, man remains in moral isolation. Priests, ministers, and rabbis, as well as psychotherapists, attest to the universality of this human phenomenon. Confession is located in that place where psychology and religion meet-guilt. Jung's views on confession bridge the chasm between psychology and religion.

Confession has a naturally curative effect on the human person. It turns out that, in spite of stories of "rugged American individualism" and the "go it alone" conception certain persons have, we were created to live in relationship with others and part of relating to others is seeking forgiveness when we fail. I am always amused when modern science tells us something that the Church has known for almost two millennia.

The Catechism calls the sacrament of confession a "sacrament of healing." Jesus, Who created us, knows human psychology perfectly. When He instituted the sacraments, He did so in perfect harmony with human nature. The sacraments work on both the natural and supernatural levels (this is perhaps

most true of the sacrament of confession). Confession is much more than a natural "feel good" mechanism. If we confess ourselves humbly (entirely) and have true contrition for our sins, receiving the sacrament of confession also confers with it divinely sanctioned forgiveness of sins and, if one has been so unfortunate as to have committed a mortal sin, the remission of eternal punishment! Those are much greater benefits than some kind of worldly and temporal psychological benefit; the benefits are eternal and beyond price. So, go to confession!
